








Trends


- 1/3 of calls related to housing needs





DEMOGRAPHICS



- No majority
 - 49% White
 - 34% Hispanic
 - 8% Black
 - 6% Asian
- Older population is 70% White
- 47% of children are Hispanic








DEMOGRAPHICS

- The Austin MSA topped 2 million for the first time in 2015. Travis County accounts for 1.2 million.
- About 25% MSA are "lowincome"
 - \$49,000 of all people in the five-county for a family of four with two adults
 - \$39,000 for a family with two children and one adult.
- In the areas shaded in orange, the low income population increased by more than 500
- In the areas shaded in blue, the low income population increased by more than 1500

HIGHLIGHTS

The health insurance rate for Travis County residents improved by

33%

From 2012 to 2016

CHALLENGES

While food access has improved from 18% to 15%,

The Obesity Rate remained essentially unchanged (23%)

Suggesting that a focus on access to **healthy** food may be of import.

WE ACHIEVE OUR FULL POTENTIAL

HIGHLIGHTS

In 2016, the Travis County Unemployment Rate was 3 % (It was 7% in 2010)

In 2016, the High School Graduation Rate

exceeded 90 % for the first time

CHALLENGES

The Unemployment Rate for African-Americans was 2 times higher than it was for Whites

49% of Central Texas students earn a degree in 6 years; the rate for African Americans is 31% & for Hispanics is 36%
